

Northern Ireland Animal Feed Statistics

The latest accredited official statistics on Northern Ireland Animal Feed produced by DAERA were released on 18th June 2026 according to the arrangements approved by the UK Statistics Authority. This monthly notice will be updated in July 2026.

Key Points

This release shows the latest animal feed statistics.

- In March 2026 total deliveries of compound and other processed animal feedstuff by Northern Ireland feedstuffs manufacturers were 305.7 thousand tonnes, which is 5.1 per cent higher than March 2025.
- In the period January to March 2026, total deliveries of compound and other processed animal feedstuff by Northern Ireland feedstuffs manufacturers were 831.2 thousand tonnes, which is 1.8 per cent higher than January to March 2025.
- In the period January to March 2026 the amount of raw materials used in the production of compound and other processed animal feedstuffs was 824.7 thousand tonnes, which is 0.7% per cent higher than January to March 2025.
- In the period January to March 2026 the amount of raw materials sold directly was 67.4 thousand tonnes, which is 4.8% per cent higher than in January to March 2025.

Methodology, Notes and Revisions Policy

User Statement

The information in the animal feed statistics is used by the Northern Ireland government as evidence for assessing market conditions and evaluating agricultural policy. The animal feed data is used to estimate the feed component of the Aggregate Agricultural Account for Northern Ireland. DEFRA also use the data in the UK Agricultural Account. Other users include the food and farming industry, academia and the general public. Survey Methodology

Feed manufacturers are required to provide this information to the Department under the Statistics of Trade & Employment (Northern Ireland) Order 1988.

Animal Feed Statistics

The data quoted in the publication are from the survey returns of all of the major Northern Ireland animal feed companies. Data on raw material use, stocks and production of the various categories of compound animal feed are recorded. The major producers typically cover 90% of total animal feed production are surveyed each month. The remaining smaller companies are sampled annually in December for their figures in the preceding 12 months. The survey data on compound animal feed is published each month and data on raw material usage is published quarterly. Weighting is used for the monthly results to include a suitable estimate for the smaller companies that have not been sampled to provide more robust and realistic monthly estimates.

Accuracy and Reliability of the Results

The accuracy of the survey results is very high because a review is carried out of all companies and the typical response rate is 100% per year.

An Accredited Official Statistics Publication

This accreditation means that the statistics:

- meet identified user needs;
- are well explained and readily accessible;
- are produced according to sound methods; and
- are managed impartially and objectively in the public interest.

Once statistics have been accredited it is a statutory requirement that the Code of Practice shall be observed regarding them. Our statistical practice is regulated by the Office for Statistics Regulation (OSR). OSR sets the standards of trustworthiness, quality and value in the Code of Practice for Statistics that all producers of official statistics should adhere to. These accredited official statistics were independently reviewed by OSR in 2011. They

comply with the standards of trustworthiness, quality and value in the Code of Practice for Statistics and should be labelled 'National Statistics'. National Statistics are accredited official statistics.

Figures in the publication are provisional and subject to revision. We will provide information about any revisions we make to previously published. Revisions could occur for various reasons, including:

- a. if we have not received survey data from respondents we make an estimate based on their previous returns. These estimates will be replaced with actual survey data when it is received.
- b. survey respondents occasionally supply amended figures for previous periods.

Please note that December 2025, January 2026 and February 2026 compound deliveries have been revised slightly, as new data has become available.
