Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) is an agricultural land-based scheme funded under Pillar 1 of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP). The scheme is accessible to all farm businesses which hold BPS entitlements, are involved in agricultural activity and can demonstrate compliance with the scheme rules as laid down in Council Regulation (EU) No. 1307/2013. Every entitlement has a monetary value, and as the unit values are based on historic payments, there is a wide variation in unit values. To generate payment, farmers must "activate" their entitlements by declaring one hectare of eligible agricultural land per entitlement. Rural by definition (settlements of less than 5,000) encompasses much of NI. Therefore, it is a fair assessment that almost all farm businesses and agricultural activity in NI are within rural areas.

No rural needs have been identified. The scheme does not create a differential impact between rural and urban areas and, as the beneficiaries of the scheme are exclusively farm businesses, there is no differential impact between different rural communities.

The project will not affect the overall budget for the BPS during scheme years 2020 and 2021. The option to continue the transition towards a flat rate payment by 2021 will result in very minor redistribution of the available direct support between farming enterprises.

Consultation and extensive data analysis was previously carried out in 2013. This was driven by EU Council Regulation (EU) No. 1307/2013, which required Member States to move from a differentiated unit value of entitlements to a flat rate. The Regulation offered a range of options for the rate of				
transition to a flat rate. These were immediate movement to a flat rate payment per hectare in 2015; transition to a flat rate by 2019; or partial transition to a flat rate by 2019. All of the legal options available resulted in redistribution of support within the applicant population.

Under Council Regulation (EU) No. 1307/2013, NI had to move the unit value of BPS payment entitlements towards a flat rate. After consulting with stakeholders and analysing data derived from 2013 Single Farm Payment (SFP) claims, the 2012 Agricultural Census and using the 2013 SFP budget, the Minister, with agreement from the Executive, decided on a gradual transition towards a flat rate over a period of seven years. The option of moving immediately to a flat rate was rejected because it would have created an abrupt and damaging redistribution of payments, leaving farm businesses very little time to prepare and adjust.

Five years of that seven-year transition period are almost complete and the amount of redistribution has been greatly reduced, hence the finding that no rural need has been identified.
